



Patrick Dolan, Jr. is the President of Enterprise Association of Steamfitters Local Union 638. As President, Pat presides over all meetings, appoints all committees and exerts a general supervision over the interests of the association.

Pat joined the union as an apprentice in 1987 and completed the five-year apprenticeship program in 1992. Pat then went on to work on a variety of construction projects as a mechanic, foreman and shop steward. In 1995, Pat was elected to the Finance Board for three years. This was followed by a six-year term on the 638 Executive Board. In 2004, Pat was elected to his first salaried position as Business Agent. He served as Business Agent for eight years until his election as President of the union in February of 2011.

Currently as President, Pat serves as chairman of the Steamfitters Industry Trust Funds. This encompasses the Pension, Medical, Security Benefit, Educational and Vacation Funds of the union and includes twelve union trustees. Pat is chairman of the Political Action Committee of Local 638.

Pat was elected Vice-President of District One by his International Union. He is also a seated Executive Board Member of the Long Island Federation of Labor, New York City Central Labor Council, Executive Council Member New York State AFL-CIO, Member of the New York City Building and Construction Trades Council, Nassau and Suffolk Building Trades Council, New York City Masters Plumbers and Master Fire Suppression Piping Contractors Licensing

Board, Town of Hempstead Labor Advisory Council, Director of the Outreach Program and Director of The Edward J. Malloy Initiative for Construction Skills, Inc..

Pat was appointed by the Governor of New York, and then elected by the New York State Assembly and Senate to serve on the State Fire Prevention and Building Code Council.

He was honored in Irish American's Labor Legacy from the Irish Echo and honored by the Liberty Democratic Association, the Ridgewood Democratic Club and the Taminent Regular Club. Among his duties as President of Local 638, Patrick has negotiated several collective bargaining agreements between the Union and the Mechanical Contractors Association in both the construction and metal trades division. These negotiations set the wages and working conditions for 8,400 members.

Pat is very involved in his community. Pat enjoyed coaching both of his children in sports while they attended Our Lady of Hope School. He coached his daughter, Alyssa, in softball and soccer. He also coached his son, Matthew, in baseball and soccer at Our Lady of Hope and at RGMVM little league. Pat was in charge of the Our Lady of Hope soccer program for 4 years, and then became the parish athletic director for 6 years. As PAR, he supervised the sports program that included over 400 children.

Pat Dolan was born in Manhattan, New York and raised in Middle Village, Queens. After graduating from Christ the King High School in 1986, he entered the Steamfitters Apprenticeship Program the following year.

Pat currently resides in Maspeth, New York with his wife Lisa, whom he has been married to for 25 years. He is the proud father of Alyssa who graduated from Fordham

University with a degree in chemistry and now is in her 2nd year at Georgetown Law School. Matthew is a senior at Quinnipiac University studying to become a physical therapist.
